What prompted the plan: (e.g. a legislative, regulatory or administrative provision)	This is a demand led proposal. The Fund will be crucial in delivering meaningful investment which will support the many communities and SMEs in the Highlands and Islands area. Over the past two years, Scotland has welcomed an increased number of visitors who (through social media and other channels) enjoy access								
	to many natural and cultural attractions. Many new 'honeypots' have developed and these play a specific role in attracting visitors and bring economic benefit to the local destination. This phenomena is very localised in Scotland and investment is required to: (a) provide quality experience at existing sites and (b) create new developments.								
	Given the geographical and economic challenges in the Highlands and Islands region this investment is highly unlikely to come from private investors.								
	Other European and national funding streams have been considered, however they do not provide the opportunity for significant investment and in most cases only support very localised development.								
	Whilst the Heritage Lottery Fund might support similar aims and objectives, applicants compete with the whole of the UK and only a fraction of funding has the potential to reach the Highlands and Islands.

Context of the Plan:	The plan will set out the strategic way that SNH will deliver a Natural and Cultural
	Heritage Fund (NCHF) as part of the Scottish Government's current ERDF Programme for Scotland.
	The Fund will target activity in the Highlands and Islands that supports development and promotion of natural and cultural heritage assets which have the direct or indirect potential to (a) create local economic and social benefit and (b) maintain or increase the natural capital assets of the Highlands and Islands.
	The region's natural, historical and cultural heritage assets are significant within the Scottish and UK context. They are unique selling points for both the region and Scotland as a whole, linking directly to opportunities for the cultural and creative industries and tourism sectors.
Description of the Plan:	The plan will describe SNH's overall vision, delivery methodology, priorities and associated outcomes for a Natural and Cultural Heritage Fund. It will be a high-level strategic document and will not explicitly cover details of projects and their possible environmental impacts. It will focus instead on a small number of high-level priorities, key actions and measures of success.
	ERDF investment will aim to enhance natural capital, increase accessibility, improve visitor experiences and expand the associated products on offer. It will potentially improve jobs and productivity in related economic sectors (such as tourism) through sensitive management, development and coordinated promotion of these assets.
